1. Young People

Small Grants up to £10,000

Girls on the Move Participation Programme: Funding for Groups

Girls on the Move is a project designed to increase physical activity levels among girls and young women in Scotland. Through the Participation Programme grants of up to £2,000 are available for projects and initiatives that target girls and young women aged 12-18 years.

Projects should aim to support participants to increase physical activity and skill levels, as well as self-esteem and confidence. Long term impact is key, and Girls on the Move is keen to fund projects that consider how activities can contribute once funding has finished.

Previous projects have included cheerleading, netball, dance, gymnastics, outdoor activities and many more. There are three rounds of funding and application deadlines are 1 September 2009, 1 December 2009 and 1 March 2010.

The Joanie's Trust (UK) supports registered charities working with young people aged 11 to 25. Each year the Trust makes approximately 30 grants with an average value of £1,000 to support projects that offer intensive support to young people as well as those that promote preventative work, and especially those that are designed to lead to individual development through integration, work opportunities or accreditation. In particular the Trust is looking to support projects that show innovation and imagination as well as evidence of close consultation with young people in developing their project.

The **Lefevre Trust** provides funding of up to £10,000 to support innovative projects between young people in France and the UK. It aims to improve understanding between the UK and France by enabling young people to visit a partner group and further develop a joint venture. Funding is available for groups of young people from across the UK and France. All groups are eligible to apply; youth groups, extracurricular clubs, sports teams, school groups, theatre troupes, arts organisations and so on. Applications for funding are accepted from the formal and nonformal education sector across the UK for young people aged 11-19.

Partnership Grants Scheme for Primary and Secondary Schools

The Royal Society has announced that the next round of Partnership Grants will open in September 2009. Through the scheme grants of between £250 and £3,000 will be available to support teachers, scientists and engineers help develop science projects. The aim is to make the teaching of science more interesting within primary and secondary schools. The Partnership grants scheme forms partnerships to allow teachers to increase their scientific knowledge and to give scientists and engineers the chance to develop their communication skills and engage with enquiring young minds. Any UK primary or secondary school teacher or practising scientist/engineer can apply as long as the students involved in the project are between 5 and 18. Applications must be made together with the partner, and need to be signed by the teacher, partner and schools' headteacher.

CASHBACK FOR COMMUNITIES allows youth projects to bid for a share of cash seized from organised criminals. A third round of funding is now open with priority given to projects which address inequalities, particularly in areas of multiple deprivation to fill gaps in provision for young people in those areas. Other areas may be funded if they are seen as suffering from particular problems or lack of resources.

The grants will fund organisations which support young people who are currently involved or at risk of becoming involved in violence, alcohol, drugs and or anti-social behaviour. The emphasis is on youth work interventions constructed with and for young people in the 10 –19 age group therefore requests for large capital items of equipment only, will not be supported.

Grants of up to £10,000 are available with applications assessed by panels consisting of local authority representatives (Community Learning and Development and Community Safety in particular); the voluntary sector; and trained young people.

Large Grants over £10,000

Comic Relief wants to fund projects working with young people between 11 and 25 experiencing problems with their alcohol use. Projects should:

- provides direct services for young people with alcohol problems
- reaches those who are vulnerable and at high risk of heavy drinking and who find it hard to access services
- provides training to equip staff with specialist alcohol skills.

Grants are available of between £15,000 and £40,000 per year and usually for between one and three years can be considered. The next deadlines are 13 November 2009 or 5 March 2010.

Big Challenge (UK)

UnLtd, has announced that the year 2 of the Big Challenge competition. The Big Challenge is a competition for young people funded by Vodafone and youth charity "V", along with social enterprise foundation and competition organisers UnLtd. The contest offers either groups of young people or those working on their own aged between 16 and 25 the chance to win a share of £60,000 funding to carry out projects that use volunteering to help tackle the problems facing the 21st century.

Applications can be submitted in any creative format and will be shortlisted by UnLtd Youth Leadership Team before a final vote by the public. Successful applicants will get part of the Challenge fund they will have their project costs paid for and support and mentoring over the rest of the Challenge year to make their ideas a reality. The Paul Hamlyn Foundation is currently accepting applications under its Education and Learning programme. The Foundation is keen to fund projects that promote innovation and change in the areas of supplementary schooling and tackling school exclusion and truancy. Eligible organisations that can apply for funding include charities, local authorities, out-of school clubs, supplementary schools, colleges and youth clubs if they demonstrate benefits to the wider community and include partnership working that will result in increasing access to education and learning to all communities and age groups.

Eligible costs include running costs such as staff salaries and overheads such as stationery, rent, rates and utilities. 2. Sport

SPORTSMATCH offer pound for pound matched funding to investments made by businesses, trusts and individuals into projects that encourage sports participation at grass roots level. The scheme targets projects that benefit young people, disability groups, BEM groups and women/girls. Projects should increase participation, new or enhanced activities and priority is given to revenue projects, e.g. coaching, competition, facilities hire rather than capital projects. It is open to voluntary groups, schools and local authorities to apply to with grants of £500 to £10,000 available.

UnLtd Sport Relief Awards supports young people who want to use sport or recreation to bring together people in their communities who are experiencing conflict or who may be divided by background or culture.

Possible examples might include engaging young people from different backgrounds by organising an indoor cricket mini world cup, a tournament designed to channel energies away from fighting and into football or an art project that uses art to reduce tensions between local groups.

Young people in the UK aged 11 to 21 can apply who are "prepared to go the extra mile" and use their passion to bring respect and understanding to their communities. Individuals or groups can apply for awards of between £250 and £10,000 as well as practical support and advice.

4. Environment

COMMUNITIES AND RENEWABLE ENERGY SCHEME (CARES) offers grants to community organisations to help with the installation of a variety of renewable energy technologies. Groups can apply for funding for technical assistance and capital grants for renewable energy equipment installation and associated costs.

There is a capital grant of up to £150,000 (50% of costs) and a technical assistance grant of up to £10,000).

The technologies that are eligible for funding include:

- hydro-electric (including wave and tidal);
- wind;
- geothermal;
- solar water heating;
- heat pumps (ground, air and water source).

Voluntary, non-profit and charitable organisations; local rural partnerships; local authorities; housing associations; universities and schools can apply. Applications in which private industrial or commercial organisations collaborate as part of consortium bids with nonprofit distributing bodies are also be accepted, provided that the private organisation is not the lead applicant / beneficiary and the project itself is non-profit distributing.

Under the **Historic Scotland Historic Building Repair Grants Scheme**, financial help is available to owners to meet the cost of high quality repairs using traditional materials and specialist craftsman to conserve original features in buildings of special architectural or historic interest. In return, owners must insure and maintain the building and allow some access to visitors. Financial help is available to owners in both the private and public sectors (home owners, trusts, commercial undertakings, local authorities) to meet these costs. Applicants must have legal responsibility for the repair of the historic building. The building must be of sufficient outstanding

architectural or historic interest; the building must be at serious risk from neglect or repair; and a need for grant for repairs to be undertaken must be demonstrated. The grants awarded range from £10,000 to £500,000 and the next closing date for applications is the 30th September 2009. See

The **Woods In and Around Towns Challenge Fund (WIAT)** and **Forestry for People Challenge Fund (F4P)** aims to bring urban woodland into sustainable management and improve recreation facilities by carrying out an agreed programme of work. The funding is targeted at woods within 1 km of settlements with a population of over 2000 people (WIAT area). The aim is to regenerate the woodland environment close to centres of population, improving the quality of life for people living and working there. The Forestry for People Challenge Fund supports local involvement in woodland projects for health, learning and strengthening communities. The two funds are available until 2013 and have annual budgets of:

- WIAT £1.5 million / year
- F4P: £0.5 million / year

The Scottish Government recently announced that the latest round of grants awarded through the **Climate Challenge Fund** has awarded £2.2 million of grants to 33 communities across Scotland. The Fund aims to empower communities to take action to reduce their carbon footprint and make a real difference to the local and national environment. It is open to voluntary sector organisations, charities, schools, colleges, universities, local authorities and housing partnerships hoping to fund projects which demonstrate a significant reduction in emissions. 5. Rural

VILLAGE SOS is a new initiative from the Big Lottery Fund and the BBC. It is searching for six UK villages with populations of under 3,000 with a great business idea and six enterprising individuals to act as Village Champions to help them achieve their ambitions. Big Lottery Fund and the BBC want to increase awareness about challenges and opportunities for rural communities across the UK. Projects should develop a community enterprise project that will demonstrate what communities can do to improve lives of local people and bring new life and energy to the village.

The deadline is 14 August 2009 with the final six projects chosen in May 2010. Successful projects will need to set up a Trust for their village to receive a grant. Informal and new groups that do not currently have a constitution or a bank account may apply. In these cases guidance will be given on how to agree some simple governance rules.

The journey of the six successful villages and their Village Champions will be filmed for a BBC One series in winter 2010.

THE MUSICIANS BENEVOLENT FUND gives awards to emerging performing groups who are generating a significant impact within their chosen field of music, have a genuine commitment to building a career as a professional group, and who can demonstrate recognised musical excellence.

The awards will be between £500 and £3,000 and are open to groups with between 2 and 10 members able to meet the following criteria:

- All group members are in the final stages of study or the first 5 years of a professional career as a musician.
- A professional musician is defined as someone who is paid to perform, compose, or work in any other productive manner related to music, and whose main source of income is this activity.
- Have been together as a group for at least one year.
- Are at least 50% British/Irish or have been resident in the UK or Ireland for at least 3 years.

Awards are available for projects that clearly show how they will enhance the musical development of the group.

Examples of projects that may be considered for funding include:

- Participation in high profile competitions or auditions.
- Coaching or mentoring sessions in the UK or abroad.
- Participation in prestigious showcases in the UK or abroad.
- Recording and releasing costs for an album, EP or single (unless the group has financial backing from a label).
- A tour or a series of concerts in the UK or abroad.
- Fees for short courses.

Organisations working with young people are eligible to apply for funding to encourage young people to produce media projects. **MEDIABOX** aims to give disadvantaged 13-19 year olds an opportunity to develop and produce creative media projects using film, television, print, radio or online platforms. Grants range from £100 to £80,000.

PRS Foundation Awards for New Works (UK)

The PRS Foundation has announced that it is currently accepting applications through its Awards for New Works scheme. The grant promotes and encourages new music, especially the commissioning of new works from UK based music creators such as composers, songwriters and producers. The maximum grant is £15,000, although awards usually average between £4,000 £5,000. Priority is given for those applications which are adventurous and innovative, both through the proposed new music and its presentation.

Small Grants up to £10,000

Community Chest Small Grants Programme

The Community Chest is available to voluntary sector groups and organisations throughout West Lothian. Grants are between £1,000 and £3,000 for eligible activities. The focus is on 2 main target groups, Women and Young People, although other projects will be considered.

The 2 key themes are:

Theme 1: Capacity Building & Early Stage Development Proposals

Assistance with the development of business plans and new project proposals. Feasibility studies. Development of organisation legal structures and constitutions. Support for organisational development, training for management committees and volunteers.

Theme 2: Implementation of Small-scale Projects

Support for new initiatives and activities delivered through existing organisations. Support for the target groups of young people and women experiencing barriers to services and excluded from employment and other opportunities.

West Lothian Development Trust Funds

The West Lothian Development Trust fund is money received from windfarm developments in West Lothian. The purpose of the fund is to assist communities within 10km of any windfarm development.

70% of all funding received will be spent in communities within 5km of any windfarm development. The remaining 30% will be spent within 10km

Projects should meet one of the following priorities:

- Relieve poverty, advance education or social purposes beneficial to an eligible community
- Promote and encourage environmental improvement or enhancement
- Secure investment, create employment, implement training, promote or secure sustainable development
- Provide or assist in the provision of renewable energy

The Trust has two strands of funding, a small grants fund of up to £2,000 and a main grants fund of up to £25,000. A maximum of 70% intervention rate applies to both grants.

Eligible areas for the Black Law Fund

- 5km - Fauldhouse
- 10km – Fauldhouse; Longridge; Stoneyburn; Breich; Addiewell; Whitburn; and Greenrigg

The West Lothian Development Trust meets bi monthly to assess applications.

Closing dates for the main grants applications are:

GATEWAY EXCHANGE FUND promotes healing, creative self expression, transformation and renewal through innovative projects which can make a difference in areas of deprivation and need throughout Scotland. Priority will be given to projects which seek to involve or empower people to move on with their lives or fulfil their potential, where they would otherwise not have the opportunity. Examples include ex-offenders, people recovering from addiction or individuals with mental health problems or recovering from abuse. The Big Lottery Fund's **Heroes Return 2 Scheme** has announced the Heroes Return 2 Scheme is now open to applications. The Heroes Return 2 Scheme provides funding to help World War II veterans who saw active service overseas with or alongside the British Allied Armed Forces in the Second World War, and are resident in the UK or the Republic of Ireland to take part in commemorative visits (within the UK and overseas) to mark the anniversary of events that led to the end of WWII.

The Heroes Return Scheme offers fixed amount grants of between £150 and £5,500 for each veteran and their spouse and/or carer towards the cost of their visit.
