Summary of the Client-Based Approach to developing and implementing an Employment and Skills Strategy on construction projects **in Scotland** Contractor and Developer Guidance



The National Skills Academy for Construction Client-Based Approach for use in Scotland provides a toolkit to deliver employment, apprenticeships and training to public sector and other procuring clients through their construction projects. A guide has also been created for contractors and developers to assist in the formulation of their response to the employment and skills requirements contained in a client's tender documents.



The 14 employment and skills areas include:

- Work experience
- Curriculum support activities
- Graduates
- Apprentices
- Subcontract Training Plans
- N/SVQs
- Employment
- Supervisor training
- Leadership training
- Advanced health and safety

The guidance includes:

- what to expect from a procuring client's tender documents;
- the documents required to respond to such tenders;
- early contractor procurement and suggested methods of ensuring that employment and skills requirements are flowed through the supply chain;
- template clauses for use in subcontracts;
- engagement with the client and supply chain during the pre-construction phase;
- practical advice on the implementation during construction; and
- ongoing monitoring of the employment and skills requirements.

The guidance also provides benchmarks which clients may expect a contractor/developer to meet through the delivery of the project or framework. They are set against a variety of contract value bands across the following project types:

- Residential
- Retail, sports, leisure, and entertainment
- Highways and roads
- Infrastructure (excluding highways)
- Factories and warehouses
- Education schools, universities

- Health hospitals, clinics
- Offices and commercial
- Regeneration
- Refurbishment/Scottish Quality Housing Standard
- Water supply and waste disposal
- Off-site structures

Repairs and maintenance

- Housing
- Non-housing

Highways – structural, maintenance, routine cyclical and routine structures
