West Lothian Council will invest around £350,000 this year on building and renovating play parks.



Councillor Tom Conn joined pupils from Linlithgow Nursery and the council's Open Space officer, Simon Scott at the recently refurbished park off Preston Road.

Road has been refurbished at a cost of £20,000, ensuring that it remains fit for purpose for at least 10 years. The council will complete a number of play area refurbishments, play area upgrades and installations of brand new play parks. These include:

- Longridge Primary School
- Glebe Play Area, West Calder

Five play parks have already been refurbished this year.

These are:

- Water Yett, Linlithgow
- Cardross Play Area, Broxburn
- Bailielands Park, Linlithgow

Executive councillor for the environment, Tom Conn said: "Opportunities to participate in play activities are essential to the healthy mental, physical, social and emotional development of children. We are committed to ensuring that West Lothian's play parks provide a safe and enjoyable environment for young people and their families and our officers put in a tremendous amount of work to ensure they are of the highest standard".

This year the council will undertake approximately 20 projects across West Lothian. The park at Preston Road,

The Best Start Grant

The school age payment is part of Best Start Grant, a package of three payments that will give extra money to low income families during the early years of a child's life. It is a £250 payment made around the time a child normally starts Primary 1 to help with the costs of a child starting school. The money can be used for anything from school uniform and shoes to a school bag, books or days out.

Applications will remain open until 29 February 2020. Parents who have deferred entry to August 2020 should still apply before 29 February 2020.

If they wait until after then it will be too late and they will miss out on their payment.

Plan sets out actions to tackle child poverty in West Lothian



West Lothian's first Annual Local Child Poverty Action Report sets out actions taken to address child poverty and has been produced by NHS Lothian, West Lothian Council and the Community Planning Partnership's Anti-Poverty Task Force.

All councils in Scotland have to produce a report in line with the Child Poverty (Scotland) Act 2017, which sets out ambitious targets for the Scottish Government to reduce child poverty in Scotland significantly by 2030. West Lothian's first plan sets out the action being undertaken and planned to reduce child poverty locally.

A report to the Council Executive in June set out the complex reasons for households falling into and remaining in poverty. The report highlights that poverty is fundamentally about a lack of disposable income.

The average level of child poverty in West Lothian is 22%, which is comparable to the Scottish level. This means that 8,551 children in West

Lothian live in relative poverty after housing costs are taken into account. The national Child Poverty Act set out that by 2023 fewer than 18% of children should be living in relative poverty. Whilst the West Lothian average is 22% this figure is higher in some areas of West Lothian (ie Whitburn & Blackburn are 32%).

"The scale of the challenge to reduce poverty at a local level should not be underestimated, especially as funding available to local authorities is limited. The fact is many of the most effective long-term interventions for alleviating child poverty sit with national government, most notably in Westminster.

However, we can't focus on what we can't control; the council is focusing on what we can do to improve the life chances for young people in West Lothian, and all agencies must work together to make progress. Ultimately we are investing in work that will hopefully reduce poverty in West Lothian, including child poverty. Our plan has a strong focus on interventions and approaches that will reduce child poverty in West Lothian."

Broxburn Academy girls triumph in Scottish Shield final

Broxburn Academy's under 18 girl's football team have been honoured for their victory in the Scottish Schools' Football Association Senior Shield final.

Work set to begin on new Livingston North Partnership Centre

Further progress has been made towards the development of a new £1 million partnership centre in Livingston.

A community and stakeholder engagement exercise took place before the summer on proposals to redevelop the Ability Centre in Carmondean to create a new, Livingston North Partnership Centre.

The proposals received positive feedback from the majority of those engaged including Scottish Library Information Council (SLIC) with the new centre incorporating the co-location of Library, Customer Information Services and the Ability Centre.

The Partnership Centre will also provide communal space for the public including an enlarged café area and dedicated space for partners such as Macmillan Cancer Support.

Stakeholders have been assured that engagement will continue as

the project progresses with regular user meetings and information briefings. A project web-site and dedicated e-mail will continue to allow project information to be communicated to stakeholders.

Arrangements to temporarily decant services from the Ability Centre to Deans Community High School have been finalised. Groups who use the existing Ability Centre are being engaged on alternative arrangements.

It is proposed that services currently at Carmondean Connected will be re-located the very short distance to the Ability Centre.

The current Carmondean Connected will no longer be required for the delivery of services.

Officers will continue to progress the project on a timescale approved by Council Executive and aim to have the new partnership centre fully operational by August 2020.



Council performance highest in Scotland

West Lothian Council's performance is the best in Scotland, according to data collected from across Scotland's councils.

Data produced by the Local Government Benchmarking Framework (LGBF) is focused on providing a consistent approach to benchmarking local authority performance in Scotland, with the results reported each year to the public. Overall, West Lothian Council ranked an average of first in Scotland out of all 32 local authorities in 2017/18.

The comparative performance of the 32 Scottish local authorities is published in an annual report that identifies national trends across eight categories of council activity. The report also highlights local challenges and priorities, how this varies across councils and the subsequent impact on performance.

At the council's Policy and

Resources Policy Development and Scrutiny Panel (PDSP) the findings of the 2017/18 evaluation were published which highlighted that West Lothian Council was rated an average of number one in two of the eight categories (Corporate Assets and Economic Development).

Leader of West Lothian Council Lawrence Fitzpatrick said: "The Benchmarking Framework is intended to support councils to improve performance in key activities, inform strategic planning and forms a critical part of the sector's response to requirements for public performance reporting and benchmarking.

"Despite facing huge challenges West Lothian Council continues

to provide excellent local services for local people and the Benchmarking Framework report confirms that. The council is West Lothian's largest employer and all staff members should be proud of the council's performance.

It is very pleasing to see that West Lothian Council continues to perform well in comparison to other authorities across a range of key indicators and had an average ranking of first overall in Scotland in 2017/18."

WOMEN IN CONSTRUCTION

An event recently took place in Blackridge which gave female students the chance to see what it is like to be involved in the construction industry.

The 'Women in Construction' event was organised by Equate Scotland and Constructionarium Scotland, hosted at Sibbald Training, Blackridge and part funded by CITB.

The event gave those in further education in 'Built Environment' courses a chance to put the theory into practice. Women currently working in the industry also came along to lend their support and give guidance to the group.

The project brought together 25 women from across Scotland where they were supported by Dale Lyon of Constructionarium Scotland and Lindsay Neill, a local

contractor, and staff of Sibbald.

The teams each had an empty site on which to set out, excavate, create formwork, tie steel rebar, lay concrete foundations and erect a wind turbine and then connect that to the power house panel. One of the participants, Jade Shearsby from Mid Calder, said:

"It has let me see how the calculations and problem-solving work done in the class can be used and is very much vital when working on site." She also felt that the practical experience gained will help her put academic problems into perspective.

Community Access to Sanitary Products

Free sanitary products will be made available in community venues across West Lothian to ensure that products are available for anyone who needs them.



In West Lothian, a range of high-quality, environmentally friendly sanitary products will be available within Partnership Centres initially. Products will be displayed in the ladies' and disability accessible bathrooms, freely available for individuals to take what they need. Plans are in place to expand availability over the next year into local community centres, GP surgeries and third sector organisations whose service users may benefit from improved access to products.

Funding has been allocated by the Scottish Government to all Scottish local authorities to take

forward plans to provide a range of products in places that people use within their local community. The main intent of the funding is to help those on low incomes by improving access to safe, hygienic and appropriate sanitary products.

Depute council leader Kirsteen Sullivan said: "Sanitary products are not a luxury and it's essential we take action now to support those in need."

Look out for the posters and window stickers which will be displayed in all venues where free sanitary products are available.

Works starts on bridge replacement

Construction has started on the replacement for Skolie Burn Bridge between Addiewell and Loganlea.

The major project to deliver the £2.4 million new bridge started recently and is expected to be completed by spring 2020.

The project will involve the construction of a temporary bridge during the works to ensure vehicle and pedestrian access is maintained, before the old bridge can be demolished and a new permanent bridge built in its place.

Executive councillor for development and transport Cathy Muldoon said: "I'm delighted that the £2.4 million project to replace Skolie Burn Bridge has now started.

"The new bridge is a key piece of

strategic infrastructure and has a design life of 120 years, and will restore full access between Addiewell and Loganlea for many generations to come."

As this is a major construction project, local residents will notice a significant amount of work on the site to enable the construction/removal of the temporary and permanent bridges, divert utilities such as gas, electricity and water, and landscape the site afterwards.

Traffic management, such as temporary traffic lights, and new layouts, will be in place during the project. Both vehicle and pedestrian

access will be maintained, except for essential short-term closures in order to construct parts of the temporary road safely.

Executive councillor for the environment Tom Conn added: "The new £2.4 million bridge will be a major boost to the local road network when completed.

"It will allow two lanes of traffic to cross without any weight restrictions when completed in 2020, improving access for the local community."

Council takes on rogue businesses in effort to reduce fly-tipping

Householders in West Lothian are being urged to play their part in tackling illegal fly-tipping.

Householders are being encouraged to check that their tradespeople have a valid waste carriers' licence before employing them.

The cost of disposing of waste in landfill sites has risen consistently over recent years for business, with the Scottish Government continually increasing the landfill tax rate (now £92.61 per tonne) in an attempt to encourage businesses to recycle more of their waste. Some businesses try to cut costs by not having a waste carriers licence, with waste often ending up being illegally dumped.

In an effort to raise awareness around illegal fly-tipping, the council will be more proactive in highlighting illegal dumping that occurs in West Lothian. The council will take photos and

share them on social media and with the local press. The council will also encourage more local residents to contact the council if they are aware of people who are deliberately fly-tipping or if they recognise any of the materials that are being dumped. The council will investigate reports and involve Police Scotland where required.

Executive councillor for the environment Tom Conn added: "It's important for residents to know that they can be fined if their waste is illegally dumped, even if it is not them that physically dumped the waste. However that can be avoided by simply asking to see a valid waste carriers licence. If a tradesperson has a waste licence and materials are still dumped residents should report the tradesperson as the

contractor is responsible. "However residents have a responsibility to check that their tradesperson has a valid waste carriers' licence in the first instance. If they don't have a waste carriers' licence, residents should ask themselves where their waste is going to end up and think twice about using their services.

"A tradesperson without a waste carriers' licence, might be able to offer a householder a slightly cheaper rate for work, but is a small saving worth a fine and/or court action?"

He added: "Fly-tipping is illegal and we will step up our efforts to catch those responsible. However, we can't do it on our own and we need residents and tradespeople to work with us."

FLY-TIPPING FACTS

The council's data show that **80% of fly-tipping locally** is caused by commercial businesses/tradespeople dumping materials such as large quantities of garden waste, old kitchens and bathrooms, building materials and items such as old car tyres.



Both tradespeople and householders are legally responsible for ensuring that they dispose of their waste items legally and safely.



The majority of fly-tipping hasn't been caused by the introduction of slim bins, bulky uplift charges or opening hours at recycling centres.

The vast majority of fly-tipping is materials that would never be placed into a household bin, picked up via a bulky uplift or taken to a council-run recycling centre.

Always check that the tradespeople you employ have a Waste Carriers' Licence. Don't use tradespeople who can't provide you with a Waste Carriers' Licence. You should ensure that the removal of waste is included in any quote for work and get a waste transfer note/receipt for taking your waste away.

If you have not made these checks, and your waste is dumped illegally, you could share liability jointly with your tradesperson and be subject to enforcement action, a fixed penalty notice or court action.

Help towards the cost of school



Free breakfasts

The council provides a free breakfast to all pupils in primary schools who want it. Breakfast is also free to those entitled to free school meals in secondary schools. Please contact your child's school direct for further details of the breakfast club times. In Secondary Schools pupils entitled to free school meals will have a breakfast provision allowance included on their National Entitlement Card (NEC)/Young Scot Card. All other secondary pupils can purchase the same breakfast for 57p.



West Lothian pupils living in a low income household could be entitled to extra help with the costs of uniforms, lunches and staying on at school.

Help is available for parents towards the cost of a school uniform, through West Lothian Council's School Clothing Grant scheme with over 6,240 pupils awarded grants in the last year.

A payment of £125 could be provided to help parents/carers with the costs of school uniforms for primary school pupils and £135 for secondary school pupils.

To qualify for a school clothing grant and free school meals, parents/carers must be in receipt of Income Support / Pension Credit, Income-based Jobseekers' Allowance, Any Income-Related element of Employment and Support Allowance, Working Tax Credit and/or Child Tax Credit with an annual income of £6,900 or less or Universal Credit where "take-home pay" does not exceed £610 per month.

Families in receipt of Working Tax Credit and/or Child Tax Credit with an annual income of £16,105 or less or, Universal Credit where "take-home pay" does not exceed

£1,342 per month will be eligible for a Clothing Grant only. All children in primary 1, 2 and 3 will receive free school lunches, regardless of financial circumstances, however families who are in receipt of the above benefits should complete an application to ensure their child receives free milk and a clothing grant.

The council also provides a free breakfast to all pupils in primary schools who want it.



Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA)

Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA) of £30 per week is also available to help students to stay on at school, and is payable depending on the household income which is assessed in the same way as for Tax Credits provided by HM Revenue & Customs. Students estranged from parents or in care of West Lothian Council can also be paid.

If the applying student is the only dependent child in the household – taxable income must not exceed £24,421, or if there is more than one dependent child in the household – taxable income must not exceed £26,884.

Applications are being accepted now. A student must be born between 1 March 2000 and 29 February 2004 to be eligible for Education Maintenance Allowance from West Lothian Council.

- Students born between 1 March 2000 and 30 September 2003 can start receiving payment from week beginning 19 August 2019. The form must arrive at the Civic Centre by 30 September 2019.
- Students born between 1 October 2003 and 29 February 2004 may start receiving payment from 6 January 2020. The form must arrive at the Civic Centre by 29 February 2020.

Application forms which do not arrive by the deadlines can only be paid from the week in which the application is received. The closing date for application forms is 31 March 2020. No application will be accepted after this date.

If the applying student is the only dependent child in the household – taxable income must not exceed £24,421, or if there is more than one dependent child in the household – taxable income must not exceed £26,884.

West Lothian Council is to invest over **£60 million** to deliver three new schools in **Winchburgh**.



Winchburgh is one of West Lothian's three Core Development areas which will see a significant number of new homes being built over the next ten years.

The council's investment will deliver:

- A replacement Holy Family Primary School with initial capacity of 231 pupils to be open by August 2022
- A non-denominational secondary school with initial capacity of 660 planned to be open by August 2022
- A denominational secondary school with capacity of 660 planned to be open by August 2023
- Separate physical education and facilities management accommodation to be available from August 2022.

The council has given the go ahead for a formal submission of a New Project Request for the delivery of the new education facilities to Hub South East Territory Partnership, who will

lead on the build project on behalf of the council.

As with all new school projects where there are changes to school catchments, a formal statutory education consultation is undertaken. The council has already commenced an initial pre-consultation exercise on the proposal to establish a new non-denominational secondary school at Winchburgh and to establish the catchment area of the school. This will be followed by a statutory consultation and it is anticipated that the final report and decision on the catchment will be made in early 2020. The council has also started the initial pre-consultation on the re-location of Holy Family Primary School with reporting of the outcomes for decision also in early 2020. The council's

Education Executive will consider a report this September seeking approval to commence the public consultation on the establishment and catchment area of the denominational secondary school in Winchburgh.

Council Leader Lawrence Fitzpatrick, said: "We believe

that this is one of the largest investments in Education anywhere in Scotland and the largest single location investment made by the council. West Lothian is one of the fastest growing areas in Scotland and more and more people are choosing to make West Lothian their home."

The council will spend over £14.5 million on the school and propose to have the school opened by August 2021. Construction is expected to begin in Spring 2020.

Partnership, who will take forward the build project on behalf of the council. As with all new school projects where there are changes to school catchments,

a formal statutory education consultation is undertaken. The council has approved the commencement on formal public consultation to review admission arrangements to

establish the catchment area of the school and review the admission arrangements arising from a variation of the catchment area of East Calder Primary School.

Executive councillor for education David Dodds said: "The council is committed to ensuring that we have sufficient education capacity for our area and we deliver modern and innovative schools to ensure that our children and communities are provided with the best possible environment and opportunities for quality learning and life chances."

Additional teaching in-service days approved

West Lothian school pupils will start back at school a day later after both the summer and Christmas break during the 2019/20 term.

Two additional in-service days have been agreed on Tuesday 20 August 2019 and Monday 6 January 2020, to support professional learning for teachers.

The additional days were proposed by the Deputy First Minister and Cabinet Secretary for Education and Skills, as part of the recent pay award negotiations with teachers' professional associations.

The changes will mean that pupils will resume school a day later on Wednesday 21 August following the summer break, and will also resume school a day later after the Christmas break on Tuesday 7 January 2020. This affects all West Lothian Council-run secondary, primary, nursery and special schools.

The dates were chosen after consultation with parent and teacher representatives, and aim to minimise disruption to pupils' education, particularly those preparing for SQA examinations.

Dangers of bin fires



The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service has warned of the dangers of deliberate fire-setting.

Last year, the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) attended over 140 wheelie-bin fires in West Lothian. While the Service continues to attend at every emergency, these incidents can impact on firefighting resources – costing around £2,000 to respond each time.

And, on occasion, firefighters have also required to call upon the assistance of police partners after coming under attack while working to protect the community.

Watch Manager Lee Clark is the SFRS Local Area Liaison Officer for

West Lothian and works closely with communities to raise awareness of the dangers and the consequences.

He said: “There is always a concern around any deliberate fire raising as it has the very real potential to not only cause injury but damage property, affect the environment and impact on surrounding businesses.

“While attending deliberate wheelie-bin fires some of my fire and police colleagues have actually been attacked while simply trying to do their job.

“This is completely unacceptable

behaviour.”

Mr Clark added: “Members of the public can help us prevent rubbish fires by considering some simple but effective safety advice.

“This includes: storing rubbish in a secure area if possible; not overflowing bins and refuse areas with excess rubbish; not putting bins out for emptying until the day of collection; being alert to strangers loitering in your street; and reporting any build-up of rubbish to your local authority or community fire station.”

You can help prevent these incidents by following this advice:

DO

- store your wheelie-bin in a secure area if possible
- take your bin in from the roadside, as soon as it's been collected
- be alert to strangers loitering in your street
- report wheelie-bin theft to the Police immediately
- warn others if fire breaks out. Call 999

DON'T

- store bins up against your home as fire can quickly spread to buildings
- overfill your bin or leave rubbish around it
- put bins out for emptying until their scheduled day
- accept deliberate fire-setting in your community.

Over 500 new build affordable homes have been provided in West Lothian over the past 14 months.

This figure contributes to an overall target of delivering 3,000 affordable homes in West Lothian from 2012 - 2022 with West Lothian having one of the most ambitious affordable housing programmes in the country.

In order to meet this target, the council has made a commitment to increasing the number of affordable homes available in West Lothian through the New Build Council Housing Programme and also by working in partnership with Registered Social Landlords (RSLs).

Since the start of 2012/13, 1,857 affordable homes have been delivered across West Lothian with the majority of these being delivered by West Lothian Council.

A further 410 houses are currently under construction at 10 sites across West Lothian. Five of the sites

are part of the council's new-build programme with the remaining five sites being developed by RSLs.

Several new affordable housing developments are also in the pipeline, including several sites for new-build council housing with the construction of 250 units across numerous locations set to begin later this year.

Executive councillor for services for the community George Paul said: "We are committed to increasing the supply of affordable housing in West Lothian. The council has one of the most ambitious and robust strategies in the country to deliver housing for its local residents. Progress has been made and we will look to continue in this manner moving forward."

A local plan to tackle homelessness in West Lothian has been approved by West Lothian Council.

The council will aim to focus on early intervention and prevention.

The Rapid Rehousing Transition Plan (RRTP) aims to implement a West Lothian wide approach to homelessness through increasing access to all social rented housing and reducing the reliance on council properties and temporary B & B accommodation. All Scottish councils must have a plan to reduce homelessness and the council's plan will now be submitted to the Scottish Government for approval.

In West Lothian, one of the key aims is to improve access to affordable housing options and reduce the length of stay in temporary accommodation. The council will aim to focus on

early intervention and prevention.

A report to the Council Executive in June highlighted that good progress has been made in the first stage in the process and a strategy on the way forward has been established. Delivery of the plan however will require resources from the Scottish Government and improved partnership working across the council, Registered Social Landlords (RSL) and community planning partners. The council has submitted a resource bid to the Scottish Government of £3million over the five years of the plan.

Homelessness at a glance

Homelessness is often associated with people sleeping rough. However, in West Lothian homelessness often means having to sleep on a friend's sofa, staying in a B&B paid for by the council or living in temporary accommodation.

Many people who present as homeless are young people who have been thrown out of their family home or have experienced a relationship breakdown whereby a couple split up.

Despite increasing the affordable housing portfolio by over 900 homes over the past five years, the waiting list for a council home is still over 8,000.

The RRTP aims to increase access to all social rented housing and reduce the reliance on council properties and temporary B&B accommodation.

Many of those who present as homeless are in employment and have various housing options available to them.

230 new homes delivered at Kirkhill

Building work has been completed at one of Scotland's largest newbuild, social rented homes sites.

Work began at the site at Kirkhill in Broxburn in 2015 to construct 230 new council homes for social rent.

The site features a mixture of cottage flats, one-to five-bedroom houses and bungalows. The first tenants moved into the area in September 2016 with handover of the final properties recently taking place in July. Executive councillor for services for the

community George Paul, said: "The Kirkhill project represents one of the largest affordable housing developments undertaken by any council in the country in recent times. The completion of building work marks a significant milestone and highlights West Lothian's commitment to delivering affordable homes for residents."

WEST LOTHIAN 'BUZZING' THROUGH NEW B-LINES PROJECT

Buglife Scotland has received a National Lottery Heritage Fund grant of over £40,000 for an exciting heritage project in West Lothian.

Made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, alongside extra funding of £12,000 from West Lothian Council, the project will work closely with the council, local community groups and schools to create accessible, wildflower-rich green spaces across West Lothian for the benefit of both

people and pollinators. The project will run for two years from June 2019 until April 2021. West Lothian B-Lines project will see the creation of seven species-rich wildflower meadows across West Lothian, resulting in enhanced habitat connectivity along the route of the recently-

mapped West Lothian B-Line. Community groups, schools and local residents will also be invited to take part in the project through a range of fun and enjoyable events including wildflower planting days, bug walks, and pollinator identification and survey workshops. The West Lothian B-Lines

project has a vision to help by transforming intensively managed amenity grassland into colourful species-rich habitats and thus more healthy functioning ecosystems.

West Lothian Council's open space officer, Becky Plunkett, said: "This is fantastic news for West Lothian, as we are committed to improving biodiversity in our parks and greenspaces, as well as providing more landscape interest and informal learning opportunities for local residents."

Riona McMorro, acting head of The National Lottery Heritage Fund Scotland, said: "We are delighted to support West Lothian B-Lines that will stimulate people's interest in the natural world and so help them conserve it for future generations."

Grass-cutting services

A number of changes to routine services such as grass cutting and grounds maintenance were made in April 2019.

The council isn't stopping any parts of the service and the council still maintains a large number of areas, but the level of service and frequency of grass cutting in some areas has been reduced.

No reductions have been made in town centres or residential areas.

Why?

The level of budget reductions that the council has to manage is going to have an impact on local services and it is impossible to continue to keep all services operating as they currently do. There is just not enough funding available to maintain the current level of service.

Some services, which are non-statutory (this means the council does not have a legal responsibility to provide the service), must be delivered in another way, which impacts upon this service standard.

Savings of £15million will be made in 2019/20. The council is expected to have delivered nearly £157 million of savings between 2007/2008 and March 2023.

Broxburn Flood Protection Scheme update



Work on the Broxburn Flood Protection Scheme is set for completion.

The Broxburn Flood Protection Scheme was designed to mitigate the risk of flooding to residential and business properties in the West Burnside and Burnside Village areas of the town from the Brox Burn and Caw Burn, and mitigate the flooding of residential properties in the Nicol Road, Pyothall Court and Galloway Crescent areas from out-of-bank flows from the Liggat Syke.

Plans to construct the final component of the scheme are

on track with sufficient funding in place and construction will provide a greater standard of protection than previously envisaged.

In addition to finalising the scheme, the paper recommended that officers are given authorisation to augment existing defences at West Main Street, Broxburn and promote a property-level protection scheme at New Holygate and Parkwood Gardens.

RiverLife and the Almond Barriers

As part of the RiverLife: Almond & Avon project, the Forth Rivers Trust, City of Edinburgh Council, West Lothian Council and SEPA are working in partnership to improve migration of fish into the River Almond and its tributaries.

The aim of this catchment-scale project is to make over 200 km of river accessible to migrating fish for the first time in generations, and improve the resilience of fish populations.

Eight redundant weirs have been identified for action by 2021, with a variety of solutions planned such as full removal,

rock ramp construction, installation of a technical fish pass or creation of a fish bypass channel.

This work is funded by Scottish Government through the Water Environment Fund and National Lottery Heritage Fund. The City of Edinburgh Council and West Lothian Council are

Plans to boost Blackburn economy

West Lothian Council is working to protect and enhance business and employment opportunities in Blackburn.



Council Executive considered two papers on the range of work being carried out across council services to support and boost economic activity in the village.

Officers are continuing to engage with Mill Centre owner, G. Dunbar & Sons (Builders) pension scheme, on options to support retail in Blackburn.

Marketing has also taken place of the nearby former filling station

site in Ashgrove, and the demolition of the adjacent former community centre is being progressed to allow this site to be redeveloped.

West Lothian Council's Business Gateway team have supported 22 Blackburn-based businesses in the last three years, investing £473,178 to create 120 additional jobs and support 450 individuals to gain training and employment support. They have helped 10 new business

start-ups during this time, with Start-up advisers and access2employment services based in Blackburn Partnership Centre to support employment opportunities.

Council Leader Lawrence Fitzpatrick said: "We will continue to make every effort to support economic prosperity in Blackburn."

Depute Council Leader, Kirsteen Sullivan added: "A range of council services are very active in the village, carrying out a variety of vital activities to make sure that there are opportunities available for residents to train for and find work, as well as businesses to relocate or expand.

"We believe that a solution is possible to support retail provision in Blackburn and discussions are ongoing to find a way forward.

"Regeneration plans for Blackburn are already ongoing through the local steering group, Blackburn's Future, as we seek to identify the best way forward to ensure the village economy flourishes."

Summer schools, programme of works

Over £5 million of improvement work to West Lothian schools took place over the summer holiday period.



West Lothian Council used the extended break for school pupils to carry out essential works on the school estate across the whole of West Lothian.

The programme comprised work to support the expansion of Early Learning and Childcare from August 2019, and included refurbishment and extension work at the Polkemmet Primary School nursery (Whitburn), refurbishment work at Carmondean and St Nicholas Primary Schools and the installation of new kitchens at Simpson Primary School (Bathgate) and St John the Baptist (Fauldhouse).

Work took place at schools across the area including: significant investment in refurbishment and internal works at Ogilvie School Campus (Livingston); toilet refurbishments at Our Lady's Primary School (Stoneyburn), Williamston Primary School (Livingston) and Springfield Primary School (Linlithgow); roof replacement works at St Ninians Primary School (Livingston) and St Nicholas Primary School (Broxburn); and phase four of the science lab refurbishment at Linlithgow Academy.

It's okay not to be okay

Pupils in West Lothian's secondary schools have been offered anxiety management group sessions this year as part of the council's programme to allow more young people to have access to emotional and mental wellbeing support in school.

The council's approach mirrors the Scottish Government's mental health initiative - prevention and early intervention approach.

The programme was piloted in 2017/18 with five schools, resulting in a reduction in anxiety levels for 80% of pupils who completed the sessions. Feedback from pupils was also positive, with pupils reporting that they had more confidence to tackle anxious situations. The programme was offered to all secondary schools in 2018/19 with approximately 53 young people attending the course.

Jennyfer McNiven, principal educational psychologist said: "This programme consists of ten weekly anxiety management sessions. The programme uses approaches such as Solution focused and Cognitive Behaviour Therapy techniques to support young people to develop an awareness of their anxieties in a supportive environment along with

peers who share similar experiences. The main focus of the programme is to encourage each pupil to recognise their anxieties, learn ways of managing these, identify individual strengths, learn new coping skills and take control of their thoughts, feelings and behaviours."

Executive councillor for education, David Dodds, added: "Addressing children's mental and physical health is one of the most important things we can do for children and their families so that they can thrive and lead fulfilling and productive lives. Schools in West Lothian have really embraced the mental health agenda and this programme is very important. It's important to break down the barriers and taboos that exist around anxiety and mental health issues and I'm delighted to hear from our team that the feedback from pupils is so positive."

COMMUNITY PAYBACK BOOST FOR LOCAL GROUPS



Local good causes have benefited from £4,000 raised through West Lothian Council's Community Payback unpaid work order scheme.

West Lothian Women's Aid (WLWA) have been given £3,000 and the Dignity Boxes charity received £1,000 from money generated through the sale of scrap metal.

Many people given a Community Payback Order (CPO) by the courts take part in unpaid work as part of their community sentence. One of the projects they undertake involves repairing bikes which are then passed on to local charities, and any bikes which cannot be repaired are then sent to scrap to redeem the value of the metal.

WLWA provides safe, temporary accommodation to women, children and young people in West Lothian who have

experienced domestic abuse, while Dignity Boxes Free makes basic toiletries available to people across the Lothians experiencing social deprivation.

Executive councillor for social policy Angela Doran added: "As well as local charities benefiting from free refurbished bikes, the money generated from scrap metal is now helping local good causes."

Community Payback is a community sentence which can be imposed by Scottish courts, which requires anyone given a CPO to give back to their local community. This is supported by targeted intervention programmes to address the issues that led to the CPO.

WLWA manager Ilena Brown said: "West Lothian Women's Aid are delighted to benefit from this valuable donation at this time.

"The funds will go towards the provision of group support and counselling to enable women to recover from their experiences of domestic abuse."

Depute Council Leader Kirsteen Sullivan said: "It's great to see two fantastic charities benefit from the council's Community Payback Unpaid Work scheme. Both West Lothian Women's Aid and Dignity Boxes carry out important work to help the local residents and deserve this additional support."

West Lothian Council is proposing to build a new complex care housing development at Cawburn Road, Pumpherston.

The Council Executive has approved plans to seek the necessary consents for the proposed new £3 million project, which will allow the project to progress.

It's expected that building work will begin next summer subject to all approvals being obtained, with a completion date expected in the autumn of 2021.

West Lothian Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) is working with NHS Lothian and other Lothian HSCPs on a redesign and modernisation programme for adults with learning disabilities which will see a significant shift in the balance of care from hospital to community settings by 2020/21. The programme focuses on

people receiving care, support and treatment within the community where possible.

Executive councillor for social policy, Angela Doran said:

"The council is committed to supporting the most vulnerable members of our communities and delivering services to support them that are accessible. To achieve this it is essential that we have appropriate property assets from which to accommodate these essential services within our communities. The proposed

project for the development of a Complex Care Housing facility supports these principles."

Research already undertaken has included visits to similar facilities to those proposed and engagement with stakeholders and potential service providers has contributed to an outline design to be developed.

As part of the planning application process the council will consult with the community who will have the opportunity to provide comment on the application.

Advice Shop offers dementia support

The staff have all been trained in dementia awareness and the Bathgate Partnership Centre is a dementia-friendly building. For those who cannot come to Bathgate, there are appointments and drop-in sessions offered throughout West Lothian and where required a home visit can

be arranged. The service will help customers to access a wide range of other types of support.

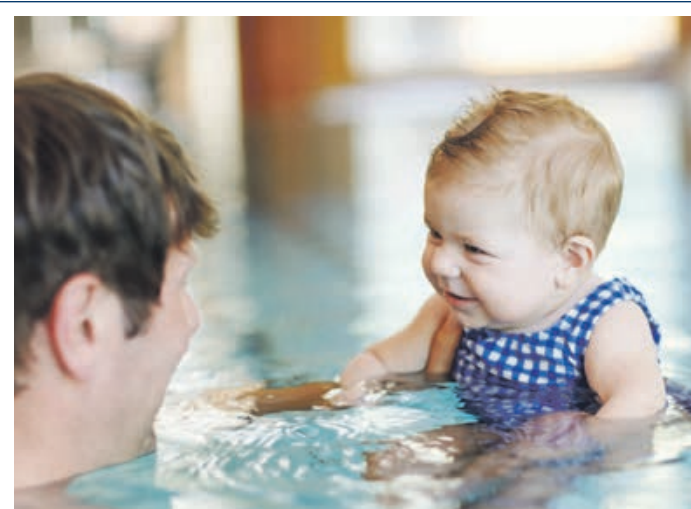

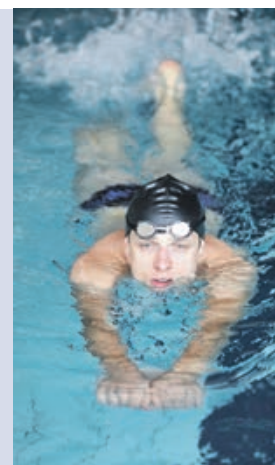

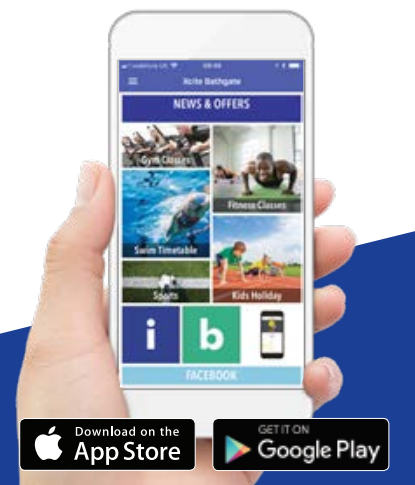
